All proceeds from this event will directly fund the Critical Incident Response Service (CIRS) which provides peer counseling to law enforcement and emergency services workers and their families who confront life-threatening circumstances in the line of duty.

Established in 2002, the CIRS has served the psychological needs of emergency response personnel and addressing potential dangers of their increased exposure to trauma and stress. As you can imagine, police officers are exposed to levels of stress critical incidents uncommon for most. They are at significantly greater risk of emotional, cognitive, and psychological injury than other occupations. Early intervention and response from trained peers has been shown to significantly mitigate this damage.

Funding for the CIRS is provided through grants and donations to FOP of Ohio Foundation, a 501C3 organization that accepts tax deductible contributions from individuals, corporations and community organizations. Operational support for CIRS is provided by the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) of Ohio; however CIRS services are available to all emergency service workers, not just FOP members.
